Covering Wisconsin (CWI)

- Initiated in 2003
- Based at UW-Madison
- Formerly Covering Kids & Families-Wisconsin (CKF)
- Mission:

To connect residents with - and promote effective use of - insurance coverage and other programs that support health

- Direct certification school outreach & education since 2011
- Other projects:
 - Health insurance enrollment navigator entity
 - Health insurance literacy

National School Lunch Program

The National School Lunch Program is a federally assisted meal program operating in over 100,000 public and non-profit private schools and residential child care institutions. It provides nutritionally balanced, low-cost or free lunches to children each school day.

Established under the National School Lunch Act, signed by President Harry Truman in 1946.

NSLP Free & Reduced Price Meals

- Children from families with incomes at or below 130% of the federal poverty level (FPL) are eligible for free meals.
- Children from families with incomes between 130% and 185% of the poverty level are eligible for reduced-price meals.
- Children from families with incomes over 185% of poverty pay full price.

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Direct Certification Overview

- ▶ Began in 1986 though USDA mandated as of 2004
- ► Automatically enrolls children in free school meals
 - ► No paper application needed
- Uses administrative data from qualifying public programs:
 - ► FoodShare (SNAP)
 - ► W-2 cash benefits (TANF)
 - ► Food Distribution Program on Indian Reservations (FDPIR)
- Also extends to children who are in foster care or who are homeless
- Variety of ways states can conduct matching

Benefits of Direct Certification

Simplifies access to free school meals

Benefits to families...

- Free school meals are an additional benefit for households receiving FoodShare/W-2 cash benefits
- No additional applications; ensures all children in household
- Extension of Benefits


Benefits to schools...

- Less paperwork; Saves time
- More reimbursement for school meals
- More kids with steady access to meals


School Participation in Direct Cert

- ▶ Required to match 95% of SNAP children by 2013-14
- Match calculated as:

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# of children directly certified through SNAP

# children in SNAP-enrolled HHs
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- ▶ In 2008, USDA began offering grants to improve rates
 - ▶ Wisconsin was at the 72% median rate
 - Qualified for funding



Covering Wisconsin and Direct Cert

- From 2007-2011, worked with Wisconsin schools to address Medicaid health coverage education and outreach
 - ► Working directly with school staff, including food services
 - ▶ USDA allows meals application info for Medicaid outreach
 - ► Aware of school staff challenges in using administrative data
 - ► Technology skills
 - ► Staff turnover
 - Competing priorities
 - Family information privacy concerns
 - Early direct certification efforts

Assessment of Wisconsin's Direct Cert

- ► Began in 2011
- Assess current challenges and how to improve state's rate
- Approach:
 - Surveyed schools on understanding, processes, challenges, and questions
 - ▶ Interviewed school admin, food service, DPI, and DCF staff
 - Conducted school site visits and observations of direct cert process
 - ► Reviewed other states' direct cert practices


Initial Assessment of WI Challenges

Overall, very positive:


- Aware of DC and ability to run more than once per year (88% of survey respondents)
- ► Found the process "worthwhile" (interview)
- And "much less time consuming than paper applications" (interview)
- Say assistance provided by DPI and DCF was very helpful (interviews)
- Believed that DC was going well and surprised that Wisconsin wasn't achieving a higher certification rate (interviews)


Challenges


- Small schools that lack the resources to run DC
- Lack of training for new staff
- Multiple persons running DC and resulting miscommunication
- Running DC perceived to be too time consuming
- Resolving near-matches
- Misunderstanding DC versus paper application
- ▶ Not aware that should run DC more than once per year
- Multitude of software used with varying capabilities
- Frequent changes to USDA policy




Percentage responding "No" (not aware)










Technology and Software Challenges

- Survey respondents identified at least 40 different software programs
- Many use a combination of programs: 125 respondents (16%)
- Others were not sure or didn't answer: 41 (4.4%)



Proposal for Improvement Grant

- ► Informational trainings, resources, and support
 - ► Annual trainings and new informational materials
 - ► Improve understanding of using various software for DC
 - ► Enhanced DPI materials and communications with schools
- New technology
 - Add new data matching fields and Soundex technology
 - Add foster care data for matching
- Evaluation and accountability
 - Ongoing school direct cert survey
 - ► Address school non-compliance with direct cert






Implementation Findings

 - > Status of variability within:
 - ► Small schools
 - **▶** Software

Variability: Software Used


- ▶ Between 2011 and 2016, consolidation of software programs being used
- ► However, still at least over 20 different programs






Variability: School Type

- Initially, Private schools more challenges by DC
- By last year, that distinction had been reduced quite a bit

Community Eligibility Provision (CEP)

- All students are offered free lunch and breakfast
- ► For high poverty schools
 - ▶ 40% or more must be directly certified
- ▶ Wisconsin's first year of participation was SY 2014-15
- Individual schools, groups of schools, or districts can participate
- ► Further reduces paperwork
 - ► Eliminates school meal application and even direct certification

FDPIR

- ▶ In the 2016-2017 school year, USDA, DPI, and Covering WI reached out to a number of tribes in Wisconsin to discuss their participation in the Direct Certification program.
- ► We are currently working with the Menominee Tribe and hope to have FDPIR matching available to schools by the 2017-2018 school year.

Direct Cert-Medicaid

- Including Medicaid-enrollee information for Direct Cert matching
- ▶ USDA approved Wisconsin pilot for 1 year, 2017-18
- ▶ 15 other states also doing
- In effect since 2012
- Offers opportunity to also directly certify for reduced price meals
- Ongoing national evaluation
- ► Thus far, 3-12% increase in DC match
